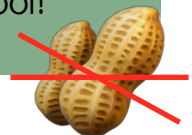


PE Kit

In RE the children have been learning about Buddhism and in History the children are learning about Mary Seacole and Florence Nightingale.



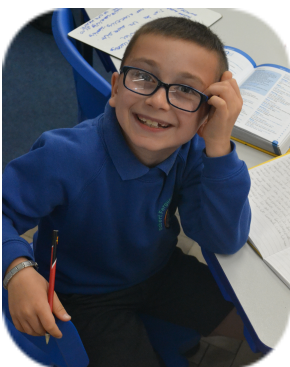
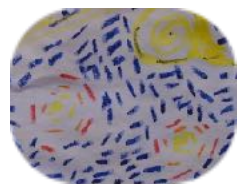
We loved the wonderful costumes on World Book Day and it is fantastic that all our children are enjoying the new library. Please ensure all books are returned after reading them.

Year 4

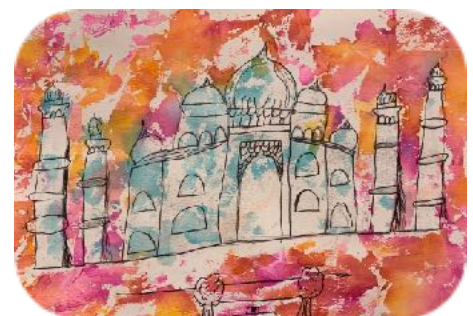
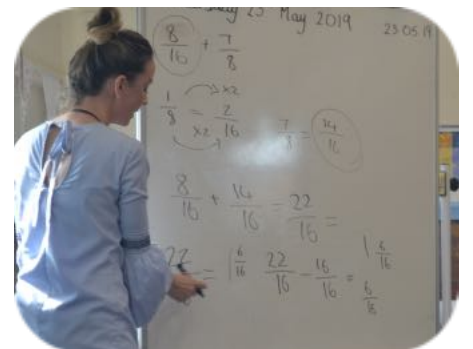
